


Put on a disguise and say, "GUESS WHOOOOO?"






If you like cats, meow. If you like dogs, bark. If you like goldfish, hmmmm . . .




When she opens the door, shout: "Grandma, your babysitter is here!"

HOW TO KEEP A GRANDMA BUSY:




As the babysitter, you need to let *her* choose. Of course, she'll want to . . .



Back at home, plan some more fun.


HOW TO PLAY WITH A GRANDMA:



If your grandma likes fancy things, decorate her with ribbons, bows, and stickers. Shout "Ta-dah!" when you hand her a mirror.








Back inside, snuggle up and . . .

"Was her grandma as fun as you?"




Now let your grandma choose where she wants to sleep.

If she asks, "Should we leave the night-light on? The hall light on? The door open?"


