


The 50th Anniversary Celebration of the

Academy of Electrical Contracting

Excerpts from NECA's Magazine "Qualified Contractor" November 1968 Edition

HE ACADEMY OF Electrical Contracting was formally launched in Philadelphia last month with induction of 65 members.

The Academy had been approved several days before its first meeting by the NECA Board of Governors.

Its aims are two-fold:

- 1. To honor the outstanding leaders of the industry.
- 2. To provide them with a new and expanded channel for service to the industry.

Harold Webster, immediate past president of NECA and as such the chairman of the new Academy, said its formation is an effort by NECA "to broaden the opportunity for industry service and continue to draw on the vast reservoir of experience of those who have given liberally of their time in past service."

The Academy held its inaugural meeting in America's first hall dedicated to learning.

There were 37 of the 65 founding members present at the Oct. 16 meeting in Philosophical Hall where the American Philosophical Society has been meeting since 1789. A massive oil portrait of Benjamin Franklin, founder of the Society, hung above the chair where Mr. Webster presided. To one side was a portrait of Thomas Jefferson, a president of the Society, by Thomas Sully. On the other side was the last of the 12 Gilbert Stuart paintings of George Washington acquired directly by the Society from the artist in 1803.


Dr. George W Corner, executive officer of the Society, told the Fellows about the Society and its purposes and said that it welcomed the opportunity to support the worthy aims of the Academy by providing Philosophical Hall as its first meeting place. He then conducted the Fellows on a tour of the historic building.



The following is a partial text of the speech of Chairman Harold A. Webster to the inaugural meeting of the Academy of Electrical Contracting on October 16, 1968 at Philosophical Hall.

HIS IS INDEED an auspicious occasion. The Fellows of the Academy of Electrical Contracting, meeting here today for the first time, start a new chapter in the history of the industry. For each of us it is an honor to have this privilege of serving our industry further.

We have the high privilege of conducting this initial meeting in America's great shrine to knowledge, Philosophical Hall, the meeting place of the American Philosophical Society founded by Benjamin Franklin and which for two centuries represented the elite of the nation's literary, scientific and academic men and women. Thomas Jefferson



was one of its Presidents and members included George Washington, Thomas Edison, Charles Darwin, Michael Faraday, Ralph Waldo Emerson, John James Audubon, the Marquis de Lafayette, Woodrow Wilson and Herbert Hoover. This venerable building, a step from Independence Hall, has been the annual meeting place of this distinguished Society since 1789 and it is, indeed, a signal recognition of the high purpose of this Academy in advancing the art of electricity that we are permitted to sit here.

This newly formed Academy of Electrical Contracting has as its objects the promotion and advancement of the interests, of the electrical contracting industry and the public which it serves by giving recognition to individuals who have served the industry well and providing a means for them to continue their contributions to progress consonant with the objectives of the Association.

It is an effort by the National Electrical Contractors Association, which has an enviable record of progressive accomplishments, to broaden the opportunity for industry service and continue to draw on the vast reservoir of experience of those who have given liberally of their time in past service. One of the tragedies of the day is the practice of industry of throwing onto the scrap heap the experience and talent of men able and eager to serve simply because they have reached an arbitrary age or point in service. The Academy is a move to lessen such waste in our industry and in doing so give a new dimension to the necessary control of change.

The theme of the 67th Anniversary Convention of NECA is "The Dimensions of Change." It provides an appropriate launching pad for the Academy. Those of us who have weathered the vicissitudes of this business – which is merely a way of saying that we have survived and adapted to change – are given an opportunity to view perhaps more objectively than some of our younger colleagues the challenges of change...

I perceive it to be the obligation of the business community to be ready with something better, and to constantly work for improvement of our economic social and political structures to accomplish orderly, disciplined change. We have failed to a marked degree when the anarchists move in as they have been doing on our campuses, into our inner cities and political assemblies. Should they succeed in destroying their targets, then our last line of defense is to have something constructive to fill the vacuum that they have created.

This is the major challenge of the moment and the new Academy provides an excellent apparatus to explore, analyze and recommend such constructive steps for our segment of the economy...

The exchange and cross-fertilization of ideas that flow when knowledgeable men in any field of endeavor come together is an important part in the role of the Academy. This is accomplished by regular meetings and the scheduling of reports to be presented and discussed. It is logical to assume that there will be an even freer flow of information and ideas due to the fact that the Fellows will be somewhat removed from the daily rough-and-tumble of their competitive business and also due to the fact that they have learned the real values of sharing.

There are important problems confronting our industry today. These naturally will be dealt with by the Association through its capable organization. These immediate day-to-day matters are not the primary concern of the Academy other than as to how they might affect the future course of the industry. The Academy will be free of the routine and the effort involved in such tactical problem solving.

The Academy will, however, be keenly interested in the past as well as the future. If you will look back over the chronicles of this industry you will find our problems are repetitive and actually are, for the most part, new only in magnitude resulting from growth. . .

I would hope that through the reflective and projective capabilities of the Academy Fellows that more light can be shed on these hangover problems of yesterday and that gradually they will disappear from our worksheets so we can devote more time and resources to new challenges.



There is a whole crop of new problems peering down on us from the horizon. Electrical technology has been so rapid and all-inclusive that it has become the dominant art in building. This is especially true in respect to the systems that fit into the shell of a structure to make it livable and productive. The electrical contractor can no longer regard himself only as a wiring contractor. If he does and makes no move to widen his field, before long he will have very little to do. It is inevitable that this industry is moving into a systems pattern relying heavily on prefabrication of components and less on jobsite fabrication. . .

This does not necessarily mean a constriction of the electrical contractor's work. Rather, it portends a dramatic increase but only if he is motivated and assisted in assuming control of all of the applications directly associated with electricity. I refer to all aspects of electric comfort, including air conditioning, communications, protection and control as well as wiring for power and light. Obviously, much of the work of the Academy will be in this area of exploring ways and means that will make the electrical contractor primary in this vast electro-environment in which we live.

It is a pleasure and a privilege to greet you here this morning and welcome you aboard this new probe into our industry's future.


Academy Board of Directors Elected Officers

Academy Speakers



1969 Dean Rusk Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV

One of the longest-serving US Secretaries of State, Rusk served under Kennedy and Johnson from 1961-69. Rusk supported diplomatic efforts during the Cuban Missile Crisis and expressed doubts about the escalation of the US role in the Vietnam War.

1970 Barry Goldwater Broadmoor in Colorado Springs, CO

Goldwater was a five-term US Senator from Arizona, who was also the Republican Party's nominee for President in the 1964 Presidential election. Goldwater is the politician most often credited with sparking the resurgence of the American conservative political movement in the 1960s.

1971 Lawrence Spivak Del Monte Lodge in Pebble Beach, CA

Publisher and journalist best known as the co-founder (with Martha Roundtree), producer and host of the TV program Meet The Press for twenty-eight years. MTP remains the longest-running continuous network series in TV history.

1972 Senator Hugh Scott Broadmoor in Colorado Springs, CO

Scott represented Pennsylvania in both the House and Senate and served as Senate Minority Leader from 1969 to 1977. He was a strong advocate for civil rights legislation and was one of the Repulican leaders in the Senate who urged President Nixon to resign in the aftermath of the Watergate Scandal.

1973 Admiral Elmo Zumwalt Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV

Zumwalt was the youngest man to serve as Chief of Naval Operations in 1970 where he began a series of moves intended to reduce racism and sexism in the Navy. In Vietnam he commanded the flotilla of Swift Boats that patrolled the coasts, harbors and rivers of Vietnam. Zumwalt ordered the spraying of Agent Orange over the Mekong Delta to kill vegetation, forcing the Viet Cong away from the water's edge.

1974 Lowell Thomas Broadmoor in Colorado Springs, CO

An American writer and broadcaster, Thomas narrated Twentieth Century Fox's newsreels until 1952. He was promoter of Cinerama (recording with three cameras and using three projectors on a curved screen). He was a broadcaster for CBS and NBC radio ending each broadcast with his classic sign-off: "So long until tomorrow".

1975 Dr. Paul McCracken Lodge in Pebble Beach, CA

McCracken was an economist and professor at the University of Michigan. He was chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors from 1969 to 1971 under President Nixon.

1976 Daniel Patrick Moynihan Boca Raton Hotel in Boca Raton, FL

A New York Senator from 1977 to 2001, Moynihan served as Assistant Secretary of Labor under Kennedy and Johnson, devoting much of his time to the War on Poverty. He also served as US Ambassador to India.



1977 Donald Rumsfeld Arizona Biltmore in Phoenix, AZ

Rumsfeld was a three-term congressman from Illinois. He later served as Secretary of Defense under Gerald Ford (1975 to 1977) and George W. Bush (2001 to 2006). He played a significant role in the planning of the US response to September 11 attacks.

1978 Clarence Kelley Lodge in Pebble Beach, CA

Kelley served as the second Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) from 1973 to 1977. He became the Chief of Police in Kansas City in 1978 and went on to start Clarence M. Kelley and Associates (CMKA), a firm that is one of the nation's leading professional investigative & security firms.

1979 General Alexander Haig Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV

Haig was White House chief of staff under Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford and was US Secretary of State under President Reagan. Following the Korean War, he served as an aide to Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara. Later he became an assistant to National Security Adviser Henry Kissinger.

1980 President Gerald Ford Rancho Las Palmas in Rancho Mirage, CA

Ford is known as the only person to have served as both US Vice President and President without being elected to either office (following Spiro Agnew and Richard Nixon, respectively). He pardoned Richard Nixon and survived two assassination attempts during his Presidency.

1981 Joe Sisko Boca Raton Hotel in Boca Raton, FL

Sisko was a diplomat who played a major role in then-Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's shuttle diplomacy in the Middle East. His career in the State Department spanned five presidential administrations and numerous foreign-policy crises.

1982 Admiral Hyman Rickover Del Coronado Hotel in Coronado, CA

Rickover directed the original development of naval nuclear propulsion and was known as the "Father of the Nuclear Navy". He is one of only four people who have been awarded two Congressional Gold Medals. He served a total of 63 years of active due and is the longest-serving naval officer in US armed forces history.

1983 Arkady Shevchenko Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV

Shevchenko was the highest-ranking Soviet official to defect to the West in 1978. In 1973 he was appointed Under Secretary General of the UN and, during his assignment in New York City, he began passing Soviet secrets to the CIA.

1984 Prime Minister Edward Heath Grosvenor House in London, England

Heath was Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1970 to 1974 and became Leader of the Conservative Party until being succeeded by Margaret Thatcher in 1975.

1985 Jack Anderson Boca Raton Hotel in Boca Raton, FL

Considered one of the fathers of modern investigative journalism, Anderson revealed the history of a CIA plot to assassinate Fidel Castro and is credited with breaking the story of the Iran-Contra affair under President Reagan. Anderson was also Washington bureau chief of Parade Magazine and was a commentator on ABC's Good Morning America for nine years.

1986 James G. Watt Wigwam in Litchfield Park, AZ

Watt was appointed by President Reagan to be US Secretary of the Interior from 1981-1983. His first political job was aide to Wyoming Senator Milward Simpson, whom Watt met through Simpson's son, Alan (our 2000 speaker).

1987 Sen. Paul Laxalt Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV

Laxalt was Governor of Nevada from 1967 to 1971 and was US Senator from the same state from 1974 to 1987. He was one of Ronald Reagan's closest friends, stemming from their work on preserving Lake Tahoe while both were governors of California and Nevada.

1988 Eric Sevareid Breakers in Palm Beach, FL



A CBS news journalist from 1939 to 1977, Sevareid was part of a group of elite war correspondents hired by Edward R. Murrow. He was first to report the fall of Paris during WWII and his aircraft was shot down behind enemy lines in Burma before he was rescued. He was commentator on the CBS Evening News for 12 years and won Emmy and

Peabody Awards for his reporting.

1989 Patrick J. Buchanan Lodge in Pebble Beach, CA

A political commentator, author, politician and broadcaster, Buchanan was senior advisor to Presidents Nixon, Ford and Reagan and sought the Republican presidential nomination in 1992 and 1996. He was a regular on the McLaughlin Group, MSNBC's Morning Joe and Fox News. He was the Academy's first speaker to attend the dinner on the night before his remarks.



1990 Lou Holtz Boca Raton Hotel in Boca Raton, FL

Trust, Love and Commitment. Head football coach at Notre Dame from 1986-1996, Holtz won the national championship just 18 months before addressing the Academy. He was known for his quick wit and ability to motivate his players. Holtz later had a lengthy career as an ESPN college football analyst.

1991 William E. Brock Broadmoor in Colorado Springs, CO

The Painful Dilemma of Education in America: The Way Out. A US Senator from Tennessee (1971-77), Brock later became US Secretary of Labor under Ronald Reagan from 1985-87. He was also Chair of the Republican National Committee (1977-81).

1992 Lt. Gen. Thomas W. Kelly Silverado in Napa, CA

Competing to Win. Director of Operations for the Joint Chiefs of Staff during the successful Desert Shield/Desert Storm initiative in 1991, Kelly described how the US military moved from the demoralized military machine following Vietnam to the well-equipped and well-trained force that defeated the enemy in Saudi Arabia



1993 Elizabeth Dole Cloister in Sea Island, GA

Volunteerism: America at its Best. Dole was the President of the American Red Cross from 1991-99. She was Secretary of Labor under George H. W. Bush and Secretary of Transportation under Reagan. Later she was a Senator from North Carolina (2003-09). She is married to former Senator Bob Dole.

1994 Mark Shields Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV

Shields is an American political columnist and commentator for various outlets, including PBS NewsHour, Inside Washington and CNN's Capital Gang. He authored *On The Trail*, about the 1984 presidential campaign. Shields has analyzed the issues affecting US Presidential elections since the 1950s.

1995 Richard Cheney Grand Traverse Resort in Grand Traverse Village, MI

Cheney was an American politician and businessman who represented Wyoming in the US House of Representatives and was Secretary of Defense (under George H. W. Bush) before addressing the Academy. Later he was elected Vice President to George W. Bush. His remarks were about the current political and defense-related strategies.

1996 Charles Osgood Ritz Carlton in Aspen, CO

Osgood is a radio and TV commentator and writer whose daily program, The Osgood File, was broadcast on the CBS Network. He also hosted CBS News Sunday Morning for 22 years. He was also the voice of the narrator of *Horton Hears a Who!*, an animated film of a Dr. Seuss' book. His remarks were about the importance of education.



1997 Dan Quayle Williamsburg Lodge in Williamsburg, VA

Quayle was Vice President to George H.W. Bush from 1989 to 1993. Before his nomination and election, he was a Congressman and Senator from Indiana. He discussed current news topics and various international events of the time

1998 Lee Sherman Dreyfus Banff Springs Hotel in Banff, Canada

Dreyfus was an American educator and politician who served as Governor of Wisconsin from 1979 to 1983. Before that he was Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. He discussed "The American Mission."

1999 Marlin Fitzwater Cloister in Sea Island, GA

Fitzwater was White House Press Secretary for six years under Ronald Reagan and George H. W. Bush—one of the longest serving press secretaries in history. Prior to that he worked at various agencies in Washington including Department of Transportation and the Department of the Treasury.

2000 Alan Simpson Sagamore on Lake George, NY

Simpson was an former American politician who served as a US Senator from Wyoming (R) from 1979 to 1997. In 2010 Simpson was appointed to co-chair President Barack Obama's National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform with Democratic co-chair Erskine Bowles of North Carolina.

2001 Brit Hume Silverado Resort in Napa, CA

Hume is a political commentator and television journalist for the Fox News Channel. Prior to that he was a correspondent for ABC, including being the Chief White House Correspondent. He also anchored Special Report with Brit Hume. Since 2008, he has been the senior political analyst for Fox News and a regular public affairs panelist for the television program Fox News Sunday.

2002 Oliver North Coeur d'Alene Resort in ID

A former Marine, North has been a political commentator and TV host. Best known for his role in the Iran-Contra Affair in the late 1980s. North was on the staff of the National Security Council. He was the host of War Stories on Fox News Channel (2001-16).



2003 Ed Koch Essex House in New York, NY

Koch is a former Mayor of New York City from 1978-89 and US Congressman (NY) from 1969-77. He was an avid movie fan and appeared in more than 60 Hollywood films and TV shows as himself. He was the judge on the TV's The People's Court.

2004 David Gergen Mohegan Sun in Uncasville, CT

Gergen is a political commentator and former presidential adviser to Nixon, Ford, Reagan and Clinton. He was the White House Director of Communications for Ford and Reagan. Recently he has been a senior political analyst for CNN.

2005 Joe Scarborough Chateau Whistler in Whistler, BC

A Congressman from Florida (1995-2001), Scarborough became a TV host on MSNBC's Scarborough Country in 2005 and Morning Joe in 2007. Morning Joe continues today as the network's premier morning show with Scarborough and his co-host Mika Brzezinski.

2006 General Anthony Zinni La Costa in Carlsbad, CA

A US Marine Corp General, Zinni was Commander in Chief of the US Central Command (CENTCOM) from 1997 to 2000. He was also US Special Envoy for Middle East Peace from November 2001 to March 2003 partly due to his foresight in predicting the dangers of terrorism coming from Afghanistan.

2007 Erik Peterson Hotel Hershey in Hershey, PA

One of the most respected analysts in global trends, Peterson is Director of the Global Strategy Institute based in Washington, DC.

2008 Frank Luntz Barton Creek Resort in Austin, TX

An American political consultant and pollster, Luntz is best known for developing "talking points" for various Republican causes, including Newt Gingrich's Contract with America. He is a frequent commentator and analyst on Fox News.

2009 Jeffrey Rosensweig Silverado Resort in Napa, CA

Global Economic Trends Driving Your Future Rosensweig is a global economics forecaster and expert on global investing and business strategy. He often appears on ABC's World News Tonight and Good Morning America. He has written a number of critically acclaimed books.

2010 Joe Ehrmann Ponte Vedra Inn in Ponte Vedra, FL

Wired for a Legacy. A former NFL defensive lineman, Ehrmann is now a minister and motivational speaker. He spoke about the challenges of teaching a boy to be a man. With his wife, they have created Building Men and Women for Others, an organization that addresses many societal challenges including violence and child advocacy.

2011 Louis Zamperini Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, WV



The subject of the bestselling book *Unbroken* (by Laura Hillenbrand in 2010), Zamperini was a runner in the 1936 Olympics in Berlin. During WW II, his plane went down in the Pacific and he survived 47 days in a life raft eventually landing on Japanese-occupied soil. He was a Japanese POW for 2½ years before returning home. He encountered a young Billy Graham,

who changed his life and enabled a return to Japan to forgive his captors.

2012 Eric Greitens Broadmoor in Colorado Springs, CO

A former Navy SEAL and Rhodes Scholar, Greitens talked about his humanitarian efforts and Navy SEAL training. He was deployed four times during the global war on terrorism, including Iraq and Afghanistan. Following his appearance, he was elected Governor of Missouri in 2017 (the second youngest Governor in the US).

2013 Patrick Henry Williamsburg Lodge in Williamsburg, VA

Okay, it wasn't the real Patrick Henry, but our "impersonator" stayed strictly within the time frame of the late 1700s. He discussed the preliminary findings by Benjamin Franklin regarding "electrical fluids", but said he doubted the value of such experiments. He discussed "homeland security", especially the move of the capital from Williamsburg to Richmond because it was more defensible. And he spoke about "states rights" vs federal government; he was not in favor of a federal government!

2014 Monty Roberts Four Seasons Biltmore in Santa Barbara, CA

Roberts, the "man who listens to horses," spoke about observing how horses were "broken". He developed a technique that he calls "Join Up", whereby a horse will accept a rider and saddle. He has written several books about the technique and has befriended Queen Elizabeth (visiting with her on several occasions). Following his remarks, Fellows and guests boarded buses to Roberts' Flag Is Up farm where we had lunch and witnessed his technique. "Trust and commitment work; when fear and force don't work."

2015 Jack Devine Stowe Mountain Lodge in Stowe, VT

Geopolitical Hotspots and International Turmoil. Devine is a veteran of the CIA, where he served as both Acting Director and Associate Director. Devine headed the CIA's Afghan Task Force which successfully countered Soviet aggression in the region. He mentioned that the dramatization of spy films (like James Bond and Showtime's Homeland) is closing in on reality.

2016 Roy Williams Grove Park Inn in Asheville, NC



Motivating Your Team. Williams is an Asheville native best known as a basketball coach at the University of Kansas Jayhawks and the University of North Carolina Tar Heels. His Tar Heels have won three national championships (2005, 2009 and 2017). Williams spoke with us about the agony months after losing the 2016 national championship to Villanova on a last-

second basket. "It's amazing what you can accomplish if you do not care who gets the credit."

2017 John "Boomer" Stufflebeem Four Seasons in Jackson Hole, WY

Some Kind of Life. Stufflebeem is a US Navy two-star rear admiral who served 39 years in the Navy and is also known for his football career (as a punter at the Academy and the NFL, hence his nickname). Also known for his television briefings from the Pentagon following the attacks of 9/11 and subsequent operations in Afghanistan. "Where a good day was going to bad places and doing bad things to bad people."

2018 R. Nicholas Burns Montage in Laguna Beach, CA

The Future of Foreign Policy. A former Ambassador to NATO and Greece, Burns offered a timely talk about the pessimism in the world and in the US, but he cited many reasons why he believes this is really a time of hope. Burns is a frequent commentator on TV. He closed with a quote from Winston Churchill, "The price of greatness is responsibility."
