This work is carried out through the National Electrical Contractors Association Political Action Committee (NECAPAC), chartered as a “separate segregated” fund under NECA’s direction.

A Letter from 2019–2020 PLC National Chair Ted Brady



The 2019-2020 election cycle was unlike any other. There were many challenges we had to overcome as an industry, but NECA contractors are resilient and we proved that in 2020. The pandemic was nothing we could have planned for and many of our businesses endured hardship and uncertainty. In my home state of West Virginia, we were one of the more open states, but there were still jobs lost and difficulty navigating the new safety protocols.

Through it all, NECA's Government Affairs team continued to fight the battles for us on Capitol Hill and with the administration to make sure our businesses could endure this pandemic. They made sure that construction was considered essential work so we could continue safely doing our jobs during the lockdowns. They worked with Congress to get relief for our businesses and various loan opportunities if we needed them. And they pushed back on policies that would hurt our companies and helped to find middle ground to mitigate the impact.

Throughout all this, there was a critical election taking place. NECAPAC continued to be the leading specialty trade construction PAC, investing \$1.4 million in more than 170 different candidates in the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate. We did this with a 90% win rate, showing our investments were made wisely. NECAPAC's involvement was necessary to ensure we had a contracting-friendly Congress in 2021.

I want to thank you all for your support of NECAPAC, especially during such an uncertain year. It has been an honor to be your 2019-2020 PLC National Chairman and I look forward to seeing the success that NECAPAC brings for years to come.

A Letter from NECA's Executive Director of Development and Engagement, Jessica Cardenas



We had a very critical election in 2020, but for most of the year, election news took a back seat to the COVID-19 pandemic. This had a major impact on regular election year activities, giving us the opportunity to get creative in engaging with Members of Congress and with our NECA contractors.

In a typical election year, NECA would host events with candidates, encourage our contractors to have meetings in their home districts and offer tours of their jobsites or training centers to their legislators. We would hold our annual Legislative Conference, where over 200 NECA contractors would lobby on Capitol Hill for a day to advocate for policies important to our industry. Instead, NECA's Government Affairs team hosted virtual meetings with candidates or one-on-one outdoor discussions. Our contractors attended virtual or socially distant in-district local events to avoid travel. We relied more on online advocacy in 2020, encouraging our contractors to send letters to their legislators using our online Legislative Action Center whenever key issues were moving through Congress. All of these activities were done to continue to create and build on our relationships in the House and Senate and make sure NECAPAC was investing in the right candidates for the 117th Congress.

Typically, our NECAPAC fundraising is done at NECA meetings throughout the year. In 2020, we were not able to do that. However, NECAPAC contributions remained steady and we were still able to make an incredible impact in the 2020 congressional elections. Instead of being able to interact with our contractors at NECA meetings in person, we engaged online

at NECA 2020 LIVE and throughout the year, and we offered several online NECAPAC sweepstakes opportunities to increase involvement across our membership.

I am constantly in awe of the dedication and support of NECA's membership. Even through the economic uncertainty of 2020, I was receiving calls from NECA contractors still looking for ways to be supportive and get involved. That kind of commitment is not common among trade associations and we are truly fortunate to have a membership that sees the value in what we do, especially during such a difficult year. I want to thank you all for your generous support, not just of NECAPAC, but of our advocacy and government affairs efforts as a whole.

We are looking forward to working with members of the 117th Congress to move NECA's legislative agenda forward over the next two years. We will continue to adapt in order to be the most effective advocates for the electrical contracting industry and ensure our members' businesses have what they need to succeed.

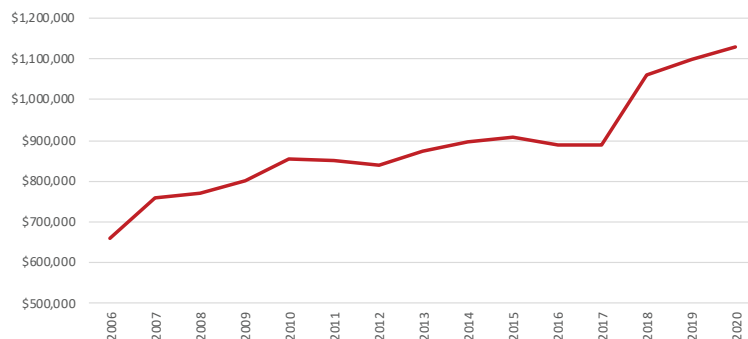

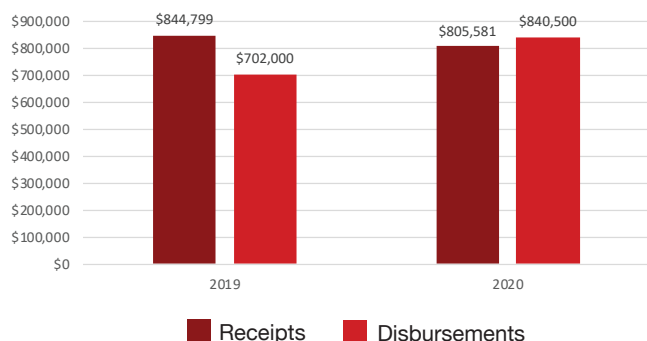

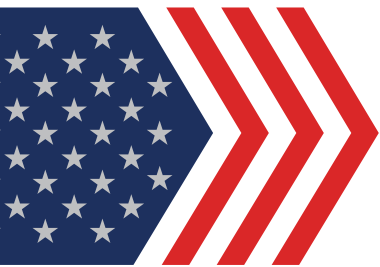

NECA's Top Legislative Issues for the 117th Congress

The National Electrical Contractors Association (NECA) is the nationally recognized voice of the electrical construction industry. NECA's 4,000 contractors bring electrical power, lighting and communications systems to buildings and communities across the United States. The following items are NECA's priority issues for the 117th Congress:

Comprehensive Infrastructure Investment

A robust investment in our nation's infrastructure is essential to keeping NECA's electrical contractors in business, their employees working, rebuilding our nation, and ensuring a sound economy.

- Find a sustainable solution to fix the Highway Trust Fund
- Increase investment in infrastructure through innovative financing mechanisms such as Public-Private Partnerships (P3s) and a National Infrastructure Bank.
- Cut red tape by continuing to reform the construction permitting process.
- Strengthen our energy infrastructure.
- Increase investment in water projects.
- Oppose efforts to arbitrarily cut federal construction accounts.

Multiemployer Pension Reform

Our contractors value and support the multiemployer pension system. It is the bedrock of the signatory electrical construction industry. In order to modernize and continuously improve the benefits our contractors offer, NECA Government Affairs continues to work towards strengthening this system.

- Authorize the creation of the innovative composite plan design, which would combine the key features of defined benefit and defined contribution plans.
- Create a special partition structure with increased federal funding to the PBGC to support those plans that have experienced a massive downturn in the current economy.
- Implement provisions like those in the Worker, Retiree, and Employer Recovery Act of 2008, and the Pension Relief Act of 2010, which would give plans the ability to freeze their zone status and smooth investment losses.

Workforce Development

NECA contractors know that their employees are a key to their success. We encourage investment in the nation's most comprehensive training programs, to highly compensate our skilled workforce, and to provide quality health care and retirement benefits. To ensure our ability to maintain this high standard and further our employees, reform should solidify these practices and encourage others to do so.

- Authorize innovative composite plans to reform the multiemployer pension system
- Approve sensible incentives and reforms to encourage apprenticeship enrollment
- Limit the expansion of publicly funded, short-term, industry approved apprenticeships in the construction industry
- Prevent the misclassification of employees as independent contractors
- Oppose efforts to repeal, suspend, or modify the Davis-Bacon Act
- Oppose limits on the use of project labor agreements

Federal Tax Reform

High tax rates and a complex tax code hampers our nation's competitive standing and hinders our economic growth. The time and money NECA contractors spend to comply with our existing and complex tax code could be—and should be—spent on growing their businesses and creating jobs.

- Make the pass-through deduction permanent to ensure certainty and predictability
- Maximize the value and integrity of the new deduction for pass-through businesses
- Repeal the estate tax
- Repeal the alternative minimum tax
- Make remaining tax extenders permanent

Contracting Reform

Small businesses are the foundation of our economy. With nearly 80 percent of NECA's membership consisting of small businesses, the need to prevent government waste, reform contracting methods, and simplify the government procurement process remains a top priority. Congress must realize that many solutions to the problems facing our contractors come at no cost to the federal government and provide bipartisan wins in an all-too-often polarized world.

- Establish a statute of repose for federal construction projects.
- Ensure payment protections for construction subcontractors and suppliers performing federal construction under Public-Private Partnerships.

- Prohibit the utilization of reverse auctions for the procurement of construction contracts.
- Improve the design-build construction process.

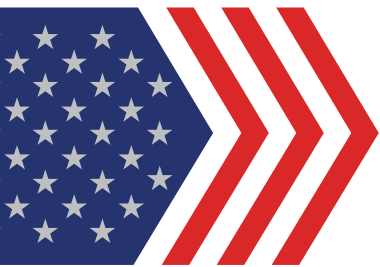
COVID-19 Relief

As our nation continues to grapple with the COVID-19 pandemic, the electrical construction industry, like many others, is in need of relief in these challenging times. We encourage Congress to continue its efforts in providing much needed support for our industry in a multitude of ways.

- Establish a federal recovery fund to provide liquidity.
- Create a federally backed pandemic insurance program.
- Work to ensure that contractors are not unfairly held liable for circumstances out of their control related to COVID-19 when all necessary guidance has been followed.
- Relax furlough laws to allow for the flexibility to decrease hours.
- Expand and extend the Paycheck Protection Program.

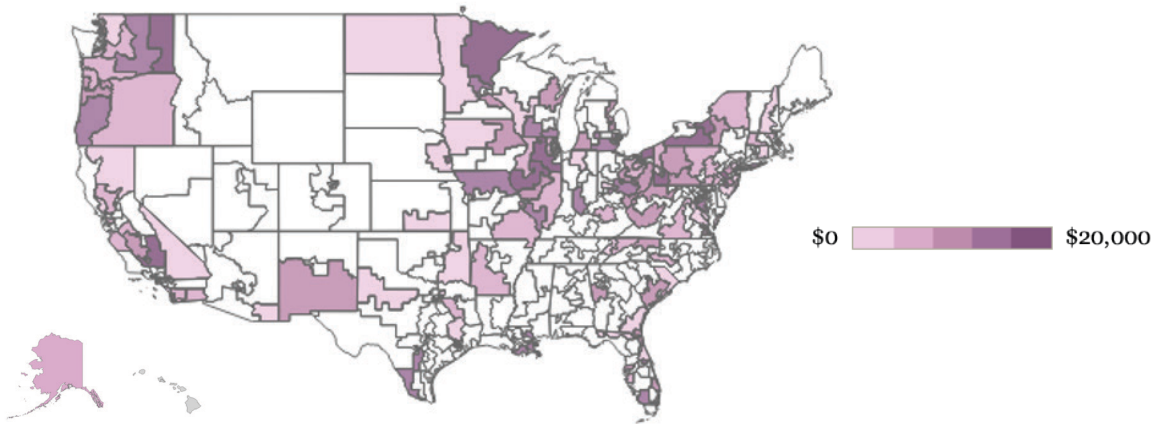

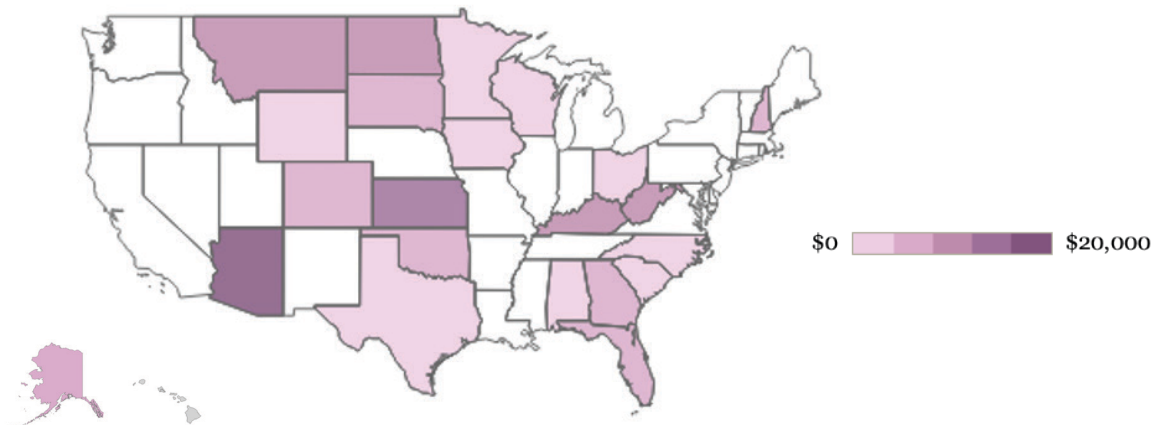

Contributions to 2020 House candidates

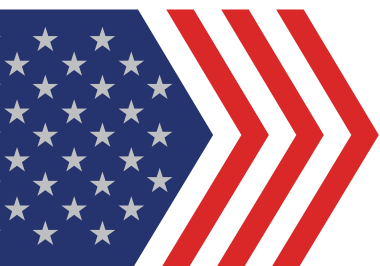


Contributions to 2020 Senate candidates

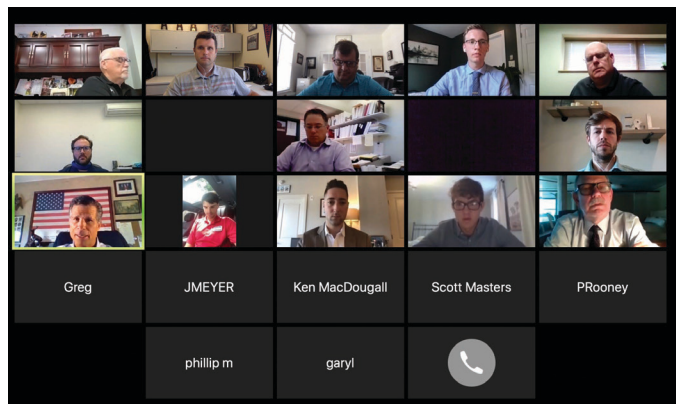
